Handicap Committee - Laurence Hughes

As you may be aware, John Timberlake is standing down as chairman of the handicap committee at the AGM and, also Jon Criddle does not believe he has enough contact with AC players of a greater than 10 handicap. I understand that those below 10 are not within their purview. I wonder whether we should take this as an opportunity to shake up our system.

Take golf handicaps for example – we have people playing off 12/11 who have been playing for many years but play little competitive, as compared to informal, croquet either inside or outside the club. Consequently, their handicaps hardly move and we have been subject to critical comments on occasions.

I don't think we have the same problem with AC, as very high handicap players, such as myself, do not venture outside the club. However, certainly at this high end of handicaps they sometimes seem to be a trifle haphazard.

Perhaps we should have small separate golf and association groups that would concentrate on the high handicap players within each discipline with the heads of these groups meeting with the club chairman to draw up proposals for handicapping policy to be approved by the club committee, e.g. for golf should every new member always start at 12 and should they be assessed at some point and the card becoming the only determinant beyond a handicap of (say) 8?

Whatever we need some new handicap committee members and, taking Jon's point, they should include people who play across a wide field including social croquet.

Sports Festival - Geoff Gunton

We attended the Sports Festival in Priory Park on May 6. Although we did not have as many visitors as the previous year or pick up any new members, I believe it is worth attending each year to raise the profile of both the club and the game and to show support for the Council's commitment in providing a croquet lawn.

Gatton Park Country Fair - Geoff Gunton

We accepted an invitation to take part in a Victorian-themed Country Fair at Gatton Park on July 1st. Despite frequent sharp showers, it was well attended and we had a good number of children and adults on the lawn all afternoon – somewhat more than we had had at the Sports Festival.





We collected two contact details for following up and others took the club leaflet and the general CA leaflets about the game. I was grateful to the six members who supported this event at various times during the day, which included four of our newest members. If we get invited again, I will be looking for more helpers: there were times when we had so many on the lawn that we had to abandon the gazebo for a few minutes, which obviously presents a security risk. And when packing up, we discovered that one of the lightweight balls had gone missing; an extensive

search of the surrounding area failed to find it. Another pair of eyes might have spotted it wander off and call it back. The CA shop no longer stocks those balls and I have not yet found a source for a replacement.

The Hoop that Hopped - John Bristow (aka Bob-the-Builder)

One day in June whilst a member was practicing with his new brass-cornered mallet a funny thing happened. An attempted hoop run ended in failure - of the hoop that is. An eyewitness claims the hoop spun around and ended

up one legged, Figure 1... The striker [technical term, see the rulebook] claims that the hit was not really hard [only 1 on the Jamie Burch Richter scale]. So how could this be?

Hoops are made of cast iron because they are cheap to reproduce, albeit a glance at the Jacques catalogue would belie that fact. Cast Iron differs from steel in that it has much more carbon in it approx 4% rather than 1%. It comes in half a dozen different metallurgical states - our hoop is most likely grey cast iron the most common form. When cast iron fails it will not deform in a noticeable way and appears to snap apart, like a biscuit [provided you haven't dunked the biscuit]. This makes it sensitive to defects and impurities many of which arise during a simple casting process. One common defect is porosity caused by small gas bubbles forming in the molten metal during casting and then trapped as the metal cools and

solidifies.

A look at the broken surface, figure.2, reveals a large defect of this type as a smooth hemispherical depression. From this initial defect a crack formed by breaking through to the surface, and developing internally, the dark oxidised surface, before the final failure [the lighter area] in June.



The hoop was made of grey cast iron was broken by a chap called Gray; that's ironic.
